Dear parents and carers,

We would like to suggest that joining the Summer Reading Challenge would be a really useful way in which to encourage your child to enjoy reading during the summer holiday. The Reading Challenge is the biggest reading event for children in libraries and is run by the charity The Reading Agency. The aim is for children to read any six books from U.K. libraries, extending over the summer from 14th July. It is suitable for all children between the ages of 4 and 11. The theme this year is called Mischief Makers, inspired by the Beano characters and books.

Once children have joined the Challenge at one of the libraries, they will be able to log the library books they have read on the website. On the website, they will also be able to engage in a range of activities such as: looking at book recommendations from other young readers and celebrities, finding out more about authors and their books, and accessing poetry. Games, competitions, online badges and rewards are also available.

Of course, we understand that some families will find it difficult to make visit to a library, but regular reading is essential to maintain and develop your child's reading and comprehension skills. We would urge the Key Stage 2 children and their parents to continue to use the Reading Objectives- at the back of the Reading Response books- to guide their discussions and to write brief notes in evidence next to each objective.

We hope to have our postponed class visits to the West Kirby library at the beginning of the new academic year.

The aim of the challenge is to get children to read any six books of their choice from their library during the summer holidays.



Please note: the Summer Reading Challenge is a library-based scheme and children must join the Challenge at a UK library to be eligible for any rewards including stickers and completer certificates.




